In an analysis of "how immigrants are transforming the politics of Europe," David Unger (New York Times, 11/30/02) observed that the Netherlands is among "several European countries where hostility to immigration...is redrawing the political map," adding that "serious social tensions have developed that establishment political parties can no longer afford to ignore." A half-century ago, the eminent humanistic psychologist Carl Rogers noted that, "we already possess learnings which, put to use, would help to decrease the inter-racial, industrial, and international tensions which exist," and emphasized that were these learnings to be used preventively, they "could aid in the development of mature, nondefensive, understanding persons who would deal constructively with future tensions as they arise" (On becoming a person, 1961/1995, p. xx).

In his latter years, Carl Rogers and his colleague Ruth Sanford conducted workshops devoted to communicating across lines of difference in South Africa, Mexico, and the former Soviet Union, among other places. Such opportunities for authentic dialogue between persons of diverse backgrounds are thought to be made possible by provision of a climate of unconditional respect, accurate empathic understanding, and genuine warmth.
